Gaydos Selected to Serve on Team Pennsylvania Foundation Board of Directors

Rep. Gaydos was nominated by House Majority Leader Kerry Benninghoff (R-Centre/Mifflin) and approved by the Team Pennsylvania Foundation to serve on its board of directors. Team Pennsylvania is a collaboration of the highest levels of public and private leadership to support Pennsylvania's goal of being a national leader in education and economic development. She is also a member of the Carbon Capture, Utilization and Storage (CCUS) Hydrogen Group.

In this capacity, Gaydos will help Team Pennsylvania Foundation, a dynamic public/private partnership, to improve and strengthen the state's workforce and help grow a vibrant economy in Pennsylvania. CCUS is a useful option for reducing greenhouse gas emissions while ensuring energy supply and spurring development of new markets for alternative fuels like hydrogen.

As a current member of the House Commerce and Education committees, and with her experience as a business owner, Gaydos will be able to contribute to furthering business growth, education and workforce development, and government efficiency in Pennsylvania.

Grants Awarded to Fire, EMS Companies in the 44th District

First responders need funding to do their jobs at peak efficiency. Rep. Gaydos announced that fire and ambulance companies in the 44th District collectively received nearly \$111,000 in state grants through the Fire Company and Emergency Medical Service Grant Program.

Funding Approved for PIT Cargo Complex

In November, the Commonwealth Financing Authority (CFA) awarded \$1 million to the Allegheny County Airport Authority (ACAA) for the Pittsburgh International Airport (PIT) Cargo

Intermodal Freight Transfer Facilities Development in Moon Township.

ACAA will use the funding to expand the PIT Cargo Building 3 aircraft apron and taxi lane and

construct a new Cargo Building 4 complex. The project involves the development of a 75,000-square-foot warehouse/processing facility, a 122,000-square-foot parking lot for tractor trailers and passenger vehicles, and a 348,000-square-foot parking apron for planes, as well as a new 212,500-square-foot taxi lane. It is estimated that PIT will need more cargo warehouse space by 2023. The funds will be used for the plumbing and electrical work associated with the construction of the warehouse/processing facility.





Perfect Attendance Recognized

One of the many duties of a state representative is to attend all House sessions so he or she can debate and vote on legislation that will benefit you.

During the 2021 calendar year, Rep. Gaydos participated, either in person or remotely due to the pandemic, in all 65 session days of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives. Her record includes all 618 votes, including 338 bills on third consideration or concurrence, 24 resolutions, 205 amendments and 51 motions.

House Majority Whip Rep. Donna Oberlander was on hand to recognize Gaydos.

House Passes Resolution to Study Common Interest Owned Communities

To help ensure fairness for homeowners, the House of Representatives adopted Rep. Gaydos' House Resolution 69 that would direct the Joint State Government Commission to study common interest owned communities (CIOCs). Specifically, the study would focus on the impact the communities have on local governments and Pennsylvania, the challenges facing the residents and governing bodies of these CIOCs, and opportunities for the Commonwealth to assist local governments and CIOCs to deliver adequate services to their residents at an affordable cost.

Many residents have voiced their complaints about association fees and limited services, including a lack of full police coverage, road repairs and trash pickup. This legislation will help local government obtain more information about Homeowners Associations (HOA) so that the general public may know more about their needs.

Supporting Tactical EMS Providers

As a former Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), Rep. Gaydos understands the need to better support the work of tactical emergency medical services

She has introduced House Bill 1331 that would add tactical EMS providers to the definitions under Title 75 of the Vehicle Code to include a certified tactical EMS provider who is affiliated with and directly supports a county or regional municipal Special Emergency Response Team or the Pennsylvania State Police Special Emergency Response Team. The inclusion of these emergency responders in the definitions will allow tactical EMS providers to use emergency vehicle lights that deliver added safety while providing for the ability to rapidly respond to an incident in progress.

The legislation is now with the House Transportation Committee for consideration.

Helping Small Businesses to Provide More Affordable Health Care Benefits to Employees

Rep. Gaydos has introduced legislation to provide a mechanism for small business employers to join together to offer quality health insurance as a benefit to their employees.

House Bill 555 would require that a group or association health plan being offered is fully insured, provides essential health benefits and protects small businesses and employees. The association health plan coverage would be guaranteed issued and renewable, prohibiting denying coverage based on a pre-existing condition, providing essential health benefits and plans comparable to the Affordable Care Act (ACA) plans. Prior to the enactment of the ACA, many companies, trade association members and nonprofits were allowed to pool together for health care, but the ACA made that prohibitive.

Federal law and regulations currently do not allow the small businesses in an association to be treated as a large employer. This legislation simply restores the right of small businesses to group together.

This practice already occurs in more than 30 states and enacting the same in Pennsylvania will enable our small businesses to reduce health care costs through group buying power.



The legislation has been referred to the House Insurance Committee for consideration.

Gaydos attended the Pennsylvania Farm Show which is the largest indoor agricultural exposition on the east coast, is a celebration of animals, equipment, entertainment and trade from the agriculture world. Agriculture is the top industry in our state, and it is essential that all of us support it. Rep. Gaydos visited Will Stiltner of Black Dog Wine Company. Recently, it was announced that the new Moon Township Dog Park will be officially known as the Black Dog Wine Company at Moon Park. The company is a boutique winery producing award-winning fine wines in the countryside of western Allegheny County.

Gaydos Human Trafficking Legislation Now Law

Legislation authored by Rep. Gaydos that would better protect the victims of human trafficking was signed into law by Gov. Tom Wolf last summer.

Act 45 of 2021 will expand the list of sexual offenses that require offenders to attend and participate in a Department of Corrections program of counseling and therapy designed for incarcerated sex

Gaydos introduced the legislation to continue to raise public awareness as well as arm prosecutors and law enforcement with every tool possible to take down traffickers and protect victims. No one should have to experience the trauma these victims are going through every day.

Gaydos Sponsors Legislation to Eliminate Death Tax

Rep. Gaydos, along with Rep. Greg Rothman (R-Cumberland), has introduced legislation that would eliminate the Pennsylvania Inheritance Tax, otherwise known as the "death tax."

Pennsylvania is one of only six states in the nation with an inheritance tax. The elimination of this tax at the state level will ensure that inheritance goes to the family or heir it was meant to go to, and it will help to protect individuals who receive an inheritance from ending up with a bill at a time they are mourning the loss of their loved one.

The federal inheritance/estate tax is applied to the transfer of property to an heir after the passing of the original owner. Federal tax is calculated based on the fair market value of the property transferred to the beneficiary of the state. However, unlike Pennsylvania, the federal estate tax has a general exclusion amount. Under the Tax Cut and Jobs Act (TCJA), the filing threshold was increased to \$11.58 million in 2020, \$11.7 million in 2021 and is adjusted for inflation through 2025.

House Bill 1148 has been referred to the House Finance Committee for consideration. Gaydos is hopeful that this legislation will come up for a vote before the full House soon.

Gaydos Advanced Manufacturing Legislation to Build Stronger, Better Economy

Rep. Gaydos has introduced legislation to support advanced manufacturing technologies by incentivizing investments in equipment, infrastructure and retention of top-tier talent.

Fostering innovation is a way the Commonwealth can advance a stronger, brighter and better economy. Advanced manufacturing enables new methods of manufacturing existing products, as well as the creation of new products emerging from new technologies. Anything we can do to incentivize this expanding industry will produce tangible economic

House Bill 1388 creates incentives through two avenues:

- Creating grants for equipment to be used in an advanced manufacturing project.
- · Allowing for state-administered low-interest loans for the purchase, construction, rehabilitation and retrofitting of facilities for advanced manufacturing infrastructure.

The bill would encourage development of advanced manufacturing facilities and infrastructure.

House Bill 1388 is with the House Commerce Committee for consideration.

Gaydos Speaks at Women's Leadership Conference

Rep. Gaydos was invited to serve as a panelist at Rep. Bud Cook's Women in Leadership Conference in the 49th District at California University of Pennsylvania. The first female majority whip of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives Donna Oberlander and newly elected Rep. Carrie Lewis DelRosso were other legislative panelists. The representatives shared their stories and took questions on how they became state legislators and the challenges faced by women in a man's world. Other panels included successful females from the trades and other industries.

Gaydos delivered this message to hard-working women: encourage one another. If you make your way to a leadership position, mentor the other women in your organization and allow their creativity and abilities to be put to good use.

- **Port Authority ConnectCards for Seniors** are available for processing at my district office in Moon Township by appointment only. Only seniors who currently use their Medicare ID card to ride public transportation for free must obtain a Senior ConnectCard.
